Jan Bremmer teaches at the University of Groningen. His recent publications include *A Cultural History of Humour: from antiquity to the present day* (ed., with Herman Roodenburg, Cambridge 1997) and (ed.) *The Apocryphal Acts of Peter: magic, miracles and gnosticism* (Leuven 1998).

Francis Blessington is the author of a book of poems, *Lantskip*, and of two books on *Paradise Lost*. He teaches at Northeastern University.

Judith Herrin is Professor of Late Antique and Byzantine Studies, King's College London. She is working on a study of three Byzantine Empresses, *Women in Purple*.

Avi Sharon is a translator of ancient and modern Greek. His version of the *Symposium* was published in 1998 (Focus), and he is the editor of *Cavafy in English* (Penguin, forthcoming). His interest in the Jews of Crete has been inspired by Nikos Stavroulakis, founder of Etz Hayim, a new synagogue and memorial to the island's Jewish presence in Chania.

Charalambos (Bambos) Neophytou lives in London, but his roots are in Galata, a village in the Troodos mountains. He read English at Jesus College, Oxford, where he recently completed an MPhil in General Linguistics; his thesis is a pragmatics approach to codeswitching between Cypriot Greek and English.

Alan H. Sommerstein is Professor of Greek at the University of Nottingham and Director of the Centre for Ancient Drama and its Reception. He was Editor of the *Journal of Hellenic Studies* from 1989-1995, and his publications include *The Sound Pattern of Ancient Greek* (1973), *Aeschylean Tragedy* (1996) and editions with translations of ten comedies of Aristophanes (1980-1998). Elizabeth Jeffreys is Bywater and Sotheby Professor of Byzantine and Modern Greek Language and Literature in the University of Oxford. Peter

Mackridge is Professor of Modern Greek in the University of Oxford and a Fellow of St Cross College. He is the author of *The Modern Greek Language* (1985) and a co-author of *Greek: A Comprehensive Grammar of the Modern Language* (1997).

David Ricks teaches at King's College London. Some of his verse translations from modern Greek recently appeared in *Modern Poetry in Translation* 13.

Michael Whitby is Professor of Classics and Ancient History at the University of Warwick. He is currently working on a translation of the *Church History* of Evagrius Scholasticus, and he is co-editor of the *Cambridge Ancient History XIV* (AD 425-600).

Ruth Webb is Assistant Professor of Post-Classical Greek in the Department of Classics, Princeton University. Her special interests are in Greek rhetorical texts of the Roman and Byzantine periods and in performance in Late Antiquity.
